First Grade - Mrs. Hendrickson


Our school year is winding down quickly, I am so proud of all my students! They have come so far since the first day of school. We need to remember our year was shut down early last year with online learning taking place. Please continue to stress to your child how important school is and to do their personal best. We have a few more assessments to finish out our year.

First Graders have quite a few assessments to do before school ends. We finished our FAST reading tests with huge gains being made! We have FAST math and STAR reading. Remember the STAR tests helps place kids in their appropriate reading levels. Please stress how important these assessments are.

In Science, we are finishing our unit on Plant and Animal Superpower. We love learning science with Doug! Mystery Science is a program we have adopted the last few years. The kids learn so much about science through his activities.

In Math, our focus is working with tens and ones. Realizing putting groups of things together and counting by 10 is a lot easier than counting individually 1,2,3 etc. We will then begin to add 2 digit numbers together. You should be seeing timed math facts coming home. Each level introduces a couple of facts to the already learned facts. Your child has 6 chances to pass that test or they will be taken back a level. Most students are on level F and some are already on Q. Please work with your child on these basic facts. Students now shouldn't be relying on counting on their fingers.

Keep on reading with your child! Reading stays with us for the rest of our lives. We use it in our jobs, in our daily lives, and is just plain enjoyable! We are in our last unit in Reading. We have learned to stretch out words using short and long vowel rules, currently we are working on base words, and adding endings to these words.



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A field trip to the zoo is being planned for the end of April. Please make sure kids are dressed appropriately and wear comfortable shoes. Please no flip flops! I have had them break which makes for a miserable trip. There is no way to fix them.

Continue to do what you do!!! Your child would not be where they are without your support at home. You really came to bat last Spring and for a couple of weeks this fall with online learning! Thank you!


Middle School SPED - Mrs. Hazelwood

Writing essays is something that all the 3rd-8th graders had to do for the Iowa Assessments. Here is some helpful information about writing essays.

There are 4 main types of essays:

- 1. Narrative essay- (Telling a Story)
- 2. Descriptive essay- (Painting a Picture)
- 3. Explanatory (Informative) or Expository essay- (Just the Facts)
- 4. Persuasive or Argumentative essay- (Convince Me)

The basic structure of an essay has 5 paragraphs and has an Introduction, Body, and Conclusion.





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Here are some essay writing tips for the different parts of your essay:

The Introduction:

Do: Pay attention to your introductory paragraph Don't: Use Passive voice or I/me/my

The Body Paragraphs:

Do: Tie things together

Don't: Be too general

The Conclusion:

Do: Be powerful

Don't: Copy the first paragraph

Introduction	 General information introducing topic Thesis Naming points to be discussed
Body paragraph 1	 First topic sentence supporting thesis Details supporting / explaining topic sentence
Body paragraph 2	 Second topic sentence supporting thesis Details supporting / explaining topic sentence
Body paragraph 3	 Third topic sentence (naming counterargument) Details eroding counterargument
Conclusion	 Thesis and main points repeated Thought-provoking or humorous ending





Middle School Science - Miss Martin

We are nearing the end of the year and we want to make sure that everyone is focused on getting through the school year with positive attitudes and continuing to work hard on every assignment. 7th grade science is currently learning about fossils and molds and created their own cast. Some students decided to make casts of their feet, hands, pens, and sea shells. For our first time, they all turned out pretty great, we talked about each one and how scientists use molds and cast to help them continue their research.

In our classroom we have butterfly larvae starting to crystallize and we are waiting for their arrival in a couple of weeks. In the next few weeks, the 7th and 8th grade students will be participating in a dissection. The 8th grade students will be dissecting a dogfish shark and the 7th grade students will be dissecting a bat. Neither of these dissections are in their book, but I thought it was important to give the students the experience about learning and discovering a once living organism and being able to "explore life" through a dissection.



4th grade continues to work on recorders. Many have already earned the orange belt and several already have the purple belt.



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


