Everyday Math Activities Kids Can do at Home

Opportunities Abound in the Kitchen, Grocery Store, and Elsewhere By Amanda MorinOpportunities to explore math with your child pop up everywhere. Going to the grocery store, cooking dinner, or even watching the news together are some of the ways these opportunities present themselves.

IN THE KITCHEN At the end of a long day, when you're thinking about getting dinner ready and getting everybody off to various appointments and lessons, creating mathematical moments is probably the farthest thing from your mind.


However, having your child help you in the kitchen not only offers the benefit of an extra pair of hands but also involves math. From measuring and sequencing to estimation and multiplication the kitchen is a real-life school for kids of all ages.

MATH ON THE ROAD While road trips and other types of travel are a wonderful way to get away from the pressures and responsibilities of real life, they also provide some really interesting opportunities to practice math.

A game called license plate math requires participants to pretend to be spies breaking codes to turn letters into numbers. That's only one of many ways to drive home math while you're driving away from home. There's also budgeting meal money, calculating the cost of gas and figuring out distances on maps.

MATH AT THE GROCERY STORE Grocery shopping, or any other kind, can be a stressful chore when your kids are with you. In between the cries of "can we buy that?" and "Ick, asparagus!" you can make the trip more manageable by drawing on some math learning. The store provides wonderful opportunities to, among other things, practice estimating cost, creating and sticking to a budget, and using the scale to weigh produce.









HELP! THE CITIZENS OF WHOVILLE NEED HELP DECIDING IF THE GRINCH IS MISCHIEVOUS OR MISUNDERSTOOD.

The past two weeks the middle school students have engaged in a Christmas unit about the Grinch.

The objectives were to learn argumentative writing and practice grammar. The topic for writing: Is the Grinch mischievous or misunderstood? Whatever the student's stance, prove it by providing a rich thesis statement, a fantastic hook, and evidence from the book and movie to back up the claim.

Specific terms in this unit:

- · Issue a topic people have different opinions about
- Claim an individual's conclusion about an issue
- Evidence logic, facts, and examples that support the chosen claim
- · Bridge the statement that explains how the evidence supports the claim
- Counter Argument challenging the argument by addressing the claim of someone who doesn't agree with the chosen claim
- Turn-back demonstrating why the counterargument is wrong

EXAMPLE for creating a thesis statement The Grinch is (mischievous/misunderstood) because (reason 1), (reason 2) and above all, because (reason 3).

Each student wrote a 5 paragraph argumentative essay on Google Docs using the correct format. Grammar items this unit included TENSES of VERBS, DENOTATION AND CONNOTATION of words, and practicing parts of speech through Grinch Libs!







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This unit was a lot of fun! We had two guest readers, Steve Hansen and Lindsey Fann and we thank them for bringing the characters to life! To add to the fun we had a snowball fight in the gym. (Crumpled paper with grammar questions) If a student found a snowball with a Grinch, he or she had to complete push-ups, jumping jacks, and sit-ups. The snowball fight was a big hit as were the silly Christmas glasses each student received during this unit.

Financial Literacy Values

his semester has been full of great discoveries for the 7th-grade class. We have discussed everything from spending and saving to investing and insurance. The students have been studying all kinds of financial scenarios and discovering the best practices for managing their money. They completed with a final project that required them to apply for a job and get a paycheck. With a one month paycheck, the students then had to create a budget that allowed them to include all expenses of living on their own, such as: renting/buying a house, buying a car/using public transportation, car, and health insurance, buying a week's worth of groceries, Dining out, and paying gas, electric, water, cellphone, internet, and cable tv services. The students were also expected to budget for "Daily Event Cards". These cards would include random scenarios that would have them pay for things that may come up in daily life. I was curious to see what the students gained most from the class. Here are their responses.

Camren R: I learned the value of money and how much money my parents have to spend for water and electricity and other things.

Kamui T: I learned how not to spend so much money.

Martin R: I learned not to get credit cards because they put pressure on you to go into debt.

I also learned to invest in Mutual Funds because they are lower risk than the stock market.

Hilda T: I learned to never go into debt and never get a credit card.

Keith T: I learned that life is hard.

Hailey W: I learned about taxes.

Wendy P: I learned about money.

Brooklyn M: Life is expensive.

Mason P: I learned to save money.



Whytt B: I learned how to save money and spend money wisely.

Tessa S: Debt isn't fun. Being an adult isn't that easy.

Taven H: I learned how much an editor gets paid. I learned how to control my spending.

December is a fun time to work on winter-themed art and holiday crafts. Preschool students made snowy owls by tearing paper. Did you know that their eyes are yellow?


