
Learning our addition math facts have been important this quarter. I have a few children almost to Z!

Spencer's favorite part of third grade has been watching movies and making cool stuff.


Shaye's favorite part of third grade has been P.E. and TeamMates.




4th Grade - Mrs. Duncan

I found this article called "How to Help Your Child Understand and Produce "WH"

Questions" written by Becky L. Spivey, M.Ed. I have included a few activities that she recommended would help our students with these question words.

- While reading simple story books with illustrations or pictures, ask your child questions like, "Who is this?" What is he/she doing? Where is the child gogin? When will he/she come back? Why is he/she leaving?" Practice these types of questions, as well as saying "The girl went to the store. Where did you go today? She is tying her shoes. What do you do when you put your shoes on? She came home from the store after lunch. When did you get home from school today?"
- Ask questions about your child's day at school using WH questions. "Who did you sit with at lunch? Where did the class go for music time? When did you play outside? What did you eat for lunch? Why did you bring home your books?
- Use picture cards made from clippings of magazines or old books. Show your child a card and say, "Ask me a question about this picture." If you are showing your child "shoes," he/she may ask, "What do you wear on your feet? Why did you get new shoes? When do you buy shoes? Where do you wear shoes? Who buys your shoes?

Your child's understanding and formulation of simple WH questions lays a foundation for developing skills in communication, generalizing, and processing information in his/her environment.







Middle School Math and History - Mr. Hendrickson

6th Grade: For the start of 2nd semester 6th grade will be learning about the history and geography of Europe. We will be creating a pamphlet later on in this Unit about a specific country. In math we will be learning about ratios and how to solve ratios with a missing number.

7th Grade: 7th grade will start 2nd semester with Ancient Greece. We will complete a project over the ancient Greek gods and goddesses. We will also be learning about ratios and proportional relationships with 7th graders. This will build on information from earlier this year and last year.

8th Grade: In Social Studies we will be covering from 1900- Present day throughout the course of this semester. Currently, in math class we are learning about linear equations and how to properly graph the equations.

In Food Nutrition we wanted to have a little fun so we made peanut butter buckeyes and homemade hot chocolate during our last week. The kids seemed to really enjoy it and couldn't believe the difference between the real homemade hot chocolate and powdered hot chocolate! I'll add the recipe we used below because it was a very good one.

Homemade Hot Cocoa

Ingredients

- 8 cups milk
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Instructions

- 1. Place milk, cocoa powder and sugar in a saucepan.
- 2. Heat over medium heat, whisking frequently, until warm (almost boiling).
- 3. Add chocolate chips and whisk constantly until the chocolate chips melt and distribute evenly into the milk.
- 4. Whisk in vanilla extract, serve immediately.
- 5. Top with whipped cream and marshmallows.

Art News

After Thanksgiving break, I wanted to let students have a chance to work with clay, especially students that have never been in the Pottery Makerspace before. Making objects from clay has several steps and it can be hard to imagine the final result. Students got to use cookie cutters to make an ornament or decorative item. Some students opted to flatten clay and then form their own design. The pieces were then fired in the kiln which is a special clay oven. Pieces that are fired once are referred to as bisqueware. Students then used ceramic glaze to paint their pieces. Ceramic glaze does not always look like the color that it will be when it is fired. It is hard for students to trust the label that says it will fire as blue, when they can see with their own eyes that before firing, it is pink. Another glaze appeared red but fired to an amber brown. Painted bisqueware was fired again resulting in the final project. Students are always amazed by the chemical reaction that has taken place resulting in the glassy look and consistency of ceramics.
