#### From Dr. Wells

**High School Conversation** 

The Hamburg School Board has been exploring bringing a high school back to Hamburg. In this article, I will explain why we are considering a high school including roadblocks which could prevent it and the community impact.

First, we have a unique and quality K-8 program. We offer programs that NO school in Iowa offers. We have the only farm school program in the state which teaches children about animals, but more importantly, it teaches students responsibility and the work ethic. We have the only elementary Spanish program in Southwest Iowa. There are only a handful of Elementary Spanish programs in the entire state. We have the only Maker Space program in Iowa and have dozens of schools coming to our community to see what we are doing with this program. Soon we will be starting a food from scratch program and family style meals. Our school had the top elementary scores in Southwest Iowa on the ESSA profile, and our middle school was second. Our school is very progressive, and our students love school and perform well. We are very concerned about the success of our students when they go to a traditional high school setting, so we are exploring expanding these programs PreK-12. A high school in Hamburg needs to be unique in the programs we offer, and we must be on the forefront of career education development. If a high school returns to Hamburg it will include Career Academies where students can learn a trade and be employable right out of high school. We are prepared to have a construction trades program (building a house each year), welding, culinary arts (become a chef), and technology

certification. ALL students attending Hamburg High School would earn a certificate, college diploma, or an Associate's Degree of Arts while attending high school at no cost to their family. No school in Iowa, and very few in the country, can offer this. We can do this through community/business partnerships.

Secondly, we have a community of approximately 1200 patrons which is large enough to sustain a PreK-12 school system. We would be a very small high school 50-60 students unless we can grow our community and add quality housing. The community has many challenges with the floodplain, but we can overcome these issues with proper planning and motivation. We have groups of people examining housing opportunities and city planning to grow our community. The first step to revitalizing our community is to bring a first class PreK-12 educational system back to Hamburg. Financially, the school district has a million-dollar unspent balance so if we are careful in our implementation it will not have a negative impact on our schools' finances. In order to have a sustainable school people who live in Hamburg need to attend and support our school. The same is true for our community. If we have a grocery store, restaurants, or hardware stores and people use them they will be sustainable. We all need to make a concerted effort to buy and think local.

Thirdly, there are roadblocks to bringing a high school back to Hamburg. We have a great deal of work to do with the lowa Department of Education to assure we can meet all state accreditation rules for a high school. The biggest challenge for us, and all rural schools, is attracting and retaining great teachers. If we cannot find amazing teachers, then we cannot pursue a high school. Parents completed surveys in the fall that showed overwhelming support for a high school. We are ready to take it to the next step which is a community meeting. The community meeting is scheduled for February 7th at 7 p.m. in the gym. At the meeting we will gather input from the community about high school programming, and a possible timeline if applicable.

Please mark your calendar and attend the high school meeting so you can give your input. I leave you with words of Helen Keller, "Life is either a daring adventure or nothing at all". We will continue to work towards this goal of identifying the 50 United States every Wednesday, so the third graders will need to study to become a member of the Nifty Fifty United States Club.

Accelerated Reading Points: Owen Nelson has the highest points in the class. He has 56.4 points since the beginning of the school year. Kyra Kimpston has 55.6 points. #### Fourth Grade – Mrs. Duncan

As the New Year begins the 4th graders are hard at work. Large numbers and Landmark numbers in addition, subtraction, and the

number system are going to be a major focus for us in math for the next few weeks. We just finished a unit on 2-D geometry and measurement in which we learned all about mirror symmetry, lines, line segments, power polygons, and angles. We will also been learning the U.S. Standard Algorithm for adding and subtracting larger numbers. I've asked the students to show their parents a different way of adding and subtracting. In science animals are our focus. Vertebrates and invertebrates have been in our studies. We learned that there are many more invertebrates than vertebrates. For Social Studies we have started to study the regions of the United States. The Northeast has been our focus so far. We are learning about the people, economy, and the geography of that region.

#### Algebra – Mrs. Hall

During the past couple of weeks, the Pre-Algebra students have been learning the laws of exponents and have been using them to multiply monomials and take powers of monomials. They have also multiplied binomials using a process called FOIL - students should be able to explain what that is! After adding, subtracting, and multiplying algebraic expressions, they will soon be learning how to divide them. Eventually, the Pre-Algebra students will learn how to factor algebraic expressions.

Algebra I students have finally completed their unit on adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing rational expressions (fractions that include numbers and variables). They are now working with square roots, and have been taking square roots of numbers. However, they will soon be working with simplifying square roots that involve variables, as well. The Algebra I students are going to get a good introduction into advanced algebra problems!

#### PLTW: Mr. Allred and Ms Martin

**Design & Modeling** -- Our 6th grade PLTW students began the new semester with a design challenge in Design & Modeling. In the challenge, students had to research Cerebral Palsy(CP) and its symptoms. Beyond that, they were given 30 minutes in class to design, build, and test a Custom Foot Orthosis(CFO). The CFO helps patients with CP by strengthening muscles and extending leg movement.

Medical Detectives -- Welcome to Medical Detectives where "Students play the role of real-life medical detectives as they collect and analyze medical data to diagnose disease. They solve medical mysteries through hands-on projects and labs, measure and interpret vital signs, dissect a sheep brain, investigate disease outbreaks, and explore how a breakdown within the human body can lead to dysfunction." We have started off this semester exploring medical diseases, jobs and learning how to take our vital signs. In the next few weeks we will be conducting experiments that help us further understand the

human body and continue to investigate the mysterious outbreak.

## M.S. Science - Mr. Allred

Sixth and 8th grade students have been studying the solar system in the past month. Each class has been doing their own investigation on planets, stars, dwarf planets, comets, and asteroids. Along with this, they have been studying the relationships of objects in relation to others, such as comparing size, mass, and distance from the Sun.

In 7th grade, we have been studying monohybrid, dihybrid, and trihybrid Punnett Squares. By doing so students have been able to see how they can find the probability of offspring being produced with one, two, or even three specific traits.

On a personal note, I wanted to announce that the 2018-19 school year will be my final year at Hamburg Community School. I have thoroughly enjoyed being a part of the community. I will miss the students, staff members, and community members who have welcomed me as part of the community for the past two years. As for me, I will be pursuing a Masters of Business Administration degree with a concentration in Accounting. I am looking forward to the next chapter but will definitely miss Hamburg.

#### Social Studies and Iron Chef - Mr. Peters

Sixth Graders are still in South America. We are exploring the East side along the Atlantic Ocean at this time. We have discussed how the Amazon River and rain forests not only affect the people close by, but how it has had an influence on our lives. It is also interesting to find out about the colonial influences that happened to South America about the same time that we had our 13 colonies.

Seventh Graders continue their ancient journey as we explore Rome. We will talk about the rise of the Roman Republic 3000 years ago and how it still influences our society today. The basis of our government, judicial system and patriarchal society will be topics to discuss during this chapter.

Eighth Graders are finished with our first 5 presidents and now discussing Native Americans on the frontier. Settlers had been moving westward from the East since the 1600s. Now we have the promise of new farmland and other work opportunities in the early 1800's. The Oregon Trail was probably the first computer game that I was able to play in middle

school, we will be doing something similar during this chapter.

After Christmas the 6th graders joined the Iron Chef class. These "Newbies" continue to impress me with their kitchen skills. Our only contest, so far, has been sugar cookie decorating. We all had a fun time mixing colors and adding sprinkles.

#### Middle School Math - Mrs. Wright

The middle school math classes have been hard at work with the start of the new semester. The 6th graders are finishing up their fractions unit. They have spent a couple days doing an Escape Room activity using their knowledge on solving fraction problems to find the codes to escape. They will be moving on to learning about measurements and conversions in their next unit.. The 7th grade class has just started a unit over ratios, rates, percentages, and proportions. They are excited to take what they have learned from their last unit and apply it to new ideas and concepts. The 8th graders have just started a unit over Quadratic Formulas. They are continuing to learn how to graph different types of equations and apply it to real world situations. They will also be gaining more foundational skills for Algebra during this unit to help prepare them for next year.

#### Elementary music—Mrs. Emberton

The elementary classes have gone back to the books to concentrate on the fundamentals of music. They've also enjoyed the January music magazines.

On January 30 the 4th graders will travel to Omaha to hear a concert by the Omaha Symphony. That is always a great trip!

The 5th grade band and 4th grade recorders are working their way through the lesson books. PLEASE encourage them to practice at home!

#### MS band and chorus--Mrs. Emberton

The MS band students have started work on the three songs for the corner conference honor band. These Hamburg students have been selected: Hailee (flute), Hermoine, Abe, Kennedy (trumpets), Gracee (French Horn) Ravyn (baritone), Emma (trombone) and Zach (percussion).

The MS chorus students started auditions for their musical "Alice in Wonderland." It's a great show with lots of great songs and wonderful characters. We've

learned the songs and are going through the dialog. We hope to present it in March.

We'll be taking 27 students to the Orpheum Theater to see "Aladdin" on January 23rd. We can't wait for that!

#### Art – Mrs. Wells

Upon coming back from Christmas Break,students have been looking at Native American art forms. Kindergarten through middle school students discussed the role of masks in some Native American cultures. They are used in dances and special ceremonies. Students made paper masks focusing on color and symmetry. Middle school students have also been able to make a 3-dimensional masks with paper mache.

Preschool through 5th graders also learned about dream catchers. They were made by some of the Native American tribes in the southwest. The dream catcher is supposed to catch the bad dreams and let the good dreams flow through. Students were able to make a dream catcher with a difficulty level suitable to their grade.

Some of our classes will be wrapping up our Native American unit by looking at totem poles. Totem poles can be compared to the idea of a coat of arms, in that both are filled with symbols that are important to a family or clan. The Native American groups of the northwest were not nomadic like groups that lived on the plains. They could set up permanent housing and heavy totems since they stayed near their fishing areas.

#### School Health - From Erika Haning, R.N.

Many parents ask, "When is my child sick enough to stay home from school?"

This is not always an easy question to answer! We hope that these tips can help!

A child who is sick will not be able to perform well in school and is likely to spread the illness to other children and staff. We suggest making a plan for childcare ahead of time so you will not be caught without a comforting place for your child to stay if he/she is ill.

Our school policy states that you should not send your child to school if he/she has:

Fever in the past 24 hours Vomiting in the past 24 hours Diarrhea in the past 24 hours Chills Sore throat Strep Throat (must have been taking an antibiotic for at least 24 hours before returning to school)

Bad cold, with a very runny nose or bad cough, especially if it has kept the child awake at night

If your child becomes ill at school and the teacher or school nurse feel the child is too sick to benefit from school or is contagious to other children, you will be called to come and take him/her home from school. It is essential that your child's teacher have a phone number where you can be contacted during the day and an emergency number in the event you cannot be reached. Please be sure that arrangements can be made to transport your child home from school and that childcare is available in case of illness. If your daytime or emergency phone number changes during the year, please notify your child's teacher immediately.

Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.

# Statement of Assurance Related to Highly Qualified Teacher Assignments

If, due to circumstances out of the districts control, a substitute or replacement teacher will be assigned to your students classroom or class for a period of time of four or more consecutive weeks and that teacher is not highly qualified in accordance with federal and state laws then the district will notify you of the situation. It is the intention of the Hamburg Community School District to provide 'highly qualified' teachers in all areas to the best of the district's ability throughout the school year.
