Just a few WAYS TO MAKE READING FUN FOR YOUR CHILD

Pick the right books

Making reading fun starts with selecting a book your child will enjoy reading. Ask your child what kinds of stories he or she likes reading best (Adventure? Fantasy?) Make a list of books in these categories and use it to help your child choose what he or she will read next.

Read aloud

Reading aloud with your child can add a bit more excitement to any book. Make the story more fun by using different voices for each character and an expressive voice for dramatic parts. You can also take turns reading aloud together, choosing a character you will each provide a voice for.

Act out the story

Help your child bring some extra excitement to reading by using his or her imagination. Have your child draw pictures of what he or she is reading, act out the scene, put on a character puppet show, or make up alternate endings.


Encourage all forms of reading

Reading doesn't always have to mean picking up a book. Magazines, graphic novels, and newspapers are other great reading materials that feel less like "work" to your child—but they still help your child practice and improve his or her reading skills.

Greatest Common Factor and Least Common Multiple are both important when working with fractions. Finding the greatest common factor and least common multiple are two skills that we are currently learning.

To find GCF:

1)List the factors (numbers that can be multiplied by another number to get a product)
Ex: 2x3 = 6, So 2 and 3 are factors of 6
2)Circle every factor that is common, or the same

3)The largest number that is the same is the GCF

To Find LCM:

1)List the multiples of the numbers (a multiple is a number that can be broken up evenly by that number) Ex: some multiples of 10 are 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, and 60 2)Find the smallest number in each list that is the same 3)This is the LCM of the numbers

Symbolism, theme, characterization, justify, determine, explain, describe, infer, and paraphrase were additional terms learned in this unit.


The highlight was baking S'mores and eating the chocolaty, messy treats!

Weaving can be done with yarn, thread, ribbons, fabric strips, or things from nature such as sticks, reeds, or vines.

Most weaving takes place on a loom which is simply a frame to help keep the weaving in place. Students used paper plates and cardboard squares for their looms.

Along with weaving, middle school students got to use fibers in string art. Enlarged clip art makes a good template for string art designs. The design is placed onto the wood and nails are placed at intervals around the design.
