It is hard to believe that we are in the last quarter of the school year. The 3rd quarter ended on March 18, 2022.

Grades will be emailed to you on Monday, March 28, 2022.

It seems we are constantly busy with activities this time of year.

Please make sure to visit our website to keep updated on activities that your child is involved in.

From March 28 - April 21, 2022, the 3rd thru 8th grade students will take the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). Please encourage your students to do his or her best on the tests.

A student who is well rested, well fed, and has a positive attitude about testing is best prepared for testing. You can help your student do his or her best by considering these tips:

- Make sure your student gets a good night's sleep and eats a healthy breakfast before each day
 of testing.
- Make sure that your student is in school and on time on test days. Reschedule dentist appointments and other out-of-school time to non-testing days.
- Remind your student that these tests are only one measure of what he or she has learned. Emphasize that you have confidence in his or her ability to do the best job possible.
- Remind your student to listen to the directions and read each question carefully during testing. Encourage your student to ask the teacher for help if he or she does not understand the directions.
- Be positive and don't fret. Your student will likely have some nervousness about the tests, but please be sure to encourage positivity and a "can do" attitude.

Thank you very much for encouraging and supporting your students during testing.

Dr. Wells - Charter School

On March 24th the lowa State Board of Education approved the Hamburg Charter High School. The charter high school has been in the planning for two years so we feel well prepared for what is before us. Interested students must pick a track or career to follow and be motivated to accomplish this track. The charter high school is not for every student, because it does require motivation to learn. If a student would like to have a low-pressure education, or traditional education, they should choose to attend a regular high school. For the students who wish to be pushed, the charter high school will offer a certificate, diploma or an Associate in Arts (AA) degree. We will have individual meetings with each of our 8th grade students to determine their career path they wish to pursue. We will advertise our charter high school in the paper and on the radio to find students who wish to have this type of educational opportunity. As of March 24th, we have 30 students who have indicated an interest in attending our school.

The concept behind our charter high school is that students will acquire a trade and the tools to leave high school and enter into a high paying profession. Early indicators support a construction trades program where students will construct a home in our community. Also, students have indicated an interest in welding, culinary arts, and medical. For students interested in a four-year college they can earn their AA degree from lowa Western Community College, while still in high school. An important element of the charter is for students to be placed in a paid apprenticeship program where they gain valuable employment skills and earn money while in high school. All charter high school students will be employed in their field of interest each summer. Freshman will work 10 hours a week for 8 weeks, 10th graders 20 hours a week, 11th graders 30 hours a week, and 12th graders will be employed full time. This will provide an opportunity for our students to assure they want to continue in this field and will allow them to build a resume for future employment. Students who have good work ethic will be hired by employers on a permanent basis. We will also allow adults in our community who are lacking employment skills to join these programs.

3 Spring Break Literacy Activities for Families

1. Play a Game as a Family

Playing games is a great way to build literacy skills. The conversation that goes on while playing games can help children build language. It also offers a chance to introduce new vocabulary words and phrases. For example:

- Have your child help read board game instructions. Help him follow each of the instructions.
- Playing word/letter related games, such as hangman and crossword puzzles, can provide lots of fun ways to practice spelling and reading.
- 2. Write About Outdoor Play

Connect playing and learning by getting outdoors. For example:

- Take your child to a neighborhood playground to have fun and get some physical exercise. When you get home, ask him to write about his favorite part of your time outdoors. If he is just learning to write, ask him to dictate a few sentences to you.
 Provide assistance with forming the sentences when needed.
- Spend time observing nature. Sit outside and watch birds, or study clouds in the sky.
 Help your child write down some words that describe his observations such as sounds he hears or movements he might see. Using the descriptive words, help him write a short poem.
- 3. Record Your Own Audiobook

Let your child have a turn reading aloud by making an audiobook. How to create an audiobook:

- Have your child select a book he would like to record himself reading.
- Have him read the book to you a couple of times. Each time your child reads the book,
 have him try changing the voices for the characters or the way he uses expressions
 when reading the sentences. Ask him if the different ways he read the book changed
 the meaning of the story.
- Record your child reading, using a tape recorder or a smartphone.
- Share his recording with a loved one.

Middle School SPED - Mrs. Hazelwood

Multiplying and Dividing Fractions is something that my middle school students are working on.

To be able to multiply and divide fractions,

students need to know how to find the factors of numbers as well as have a good understanding of multiplication facts.

To multiply fractions, first the numerators need to be multiplied and then the denominators need to be multiplied.


After this, the fraction can be simplified.

One method for multiplying fractions is to simplify the fractions before multiplying. With this method, multiplying and dividing large numbers is avoided.

Remember, all numbers have 1 and themselves as factors. So, any number divided by itself will equal 1.







Multiplying Fractions

(Chap 6-1 page 261)

$$\frac{3}{4} \times \frac{8^2}{9_3} = \frac{2}{3} \quad \left(\frac{3}{3}\right) \times \left(\frac{4}{4}\right) \times \frac{2}{3}$$

Method 2: (cross-cancelling)

Step 1: Simplify using cross-cancelling.

Step 2: Multiply the numerators and

multiply the denominators.

Dividing fractions is as simple as remembering "keep, flip, change". Keep the first fraction the same, change the division sign to multiplication, and flip the second fraction over to create the reciprocal.

Then, students can multiply the fractions together like normal.

Some students struggle a lot with figuring out how to multiply and divide fractions. With these methods, students will be able to master fractions in no time!

Middle School Math and History - Mr. Hendrickson
