It's hard to believe winter is around the corner, but our first snow has fallen, so it's time to start preparing. There are a lot of fun things to do outside in winter. However, it is important to consider safety.

The American Academy of Pediatrics has provided us with some helpful winter health and safety tips:

Outdoor Winter Activities

Sledding is a great way to get exercise on a cold winter day. Remember, children should be supervised at all times.



It is safer to sled feet first or sitting up, instead of lying down head-first.

Sled on slopes that are not too steep and are free of obstructions like trees or fences.

Do not chew gum or eat candy while sledding.

Stay away from crowded areas.

Other winter concerns:

Nosebleeds

If your child suffers from winter nosebleeds it may be from the dry air. Try using a cold air humidifier in the child's room at night. Saline nose drops or petroleum jelly may help too. If severe, consult your pediatrician.

Hypothermia/Frostbite

When it is cold outside, remember to set a reasonable time limit on outdoor play and have children come inside periodically to warm up. Dressing in layers is best.

Lice

This time of year, we often get a few cases of lice. There were a few cases in the fall, but currently, it has not been a concern.



Adult head lice or their eggs (nits) are found in the hair, most often behind the ears and at the base of the neck. Head lice are most commonly spread by direct head-to-head contact with hair of other people who have head lice.

Head lice are less commonly spread through contact with an infested person's personal items, such as hair brushes and combs, hats, unwashed clothing, bedding or towels. Head lice are commonly spread within households.

There are a number of effective treatments for head lice. Treatment for head lice usually consists of shampooing the hair with a medicated shampoo. Consult with your pediatrician for treatment of head lice.

Head lice are certainly a nuisance, but they are not generally considered a health hazard. Both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Association of School Nurses advocate that "no-nit" policies in schools should be abandoned. Head lice are not a health hazard or a sign of poor hygiene and are not responsible for the spread of any disease. No healthy child should be excluded from or miss school because of head lice.

School Nurse Notes:

By now we are all aware of the community outbreak in Fremont County of COVID-19. Please consider the newest guidelines from our Governor. Wearing a mask when you are unable to stay 6 feet apart in public is the best way to keep you and your family safe.

We are following the CDC, IDPH, and Fremont County Public Health recommendations. If your child is sick or experiencing any symptoms we ask that you keep them home from school. Any child with a fever of 100.4F will not be able to return to school until they are fever free without medication for 24 hours. I know this is a trying time for everyone. We will be able to get through this together. If you have any questions please do not hesitate to call or email me.



Ten-Twenty-Thirty

Try this single-player addition game! All you need is a deck of playing cards to get started. Try to find sums of 10, 20, or 30 in order to clear cards. Practice your adding, and double check you work. If you can clear all of the cards, you'll win! "Ten-Twenty-Thirty" is a great way to have fun while practicing simple addition facts. After you've mastered the directions, check out the variations for new ways to play.

Skill: Addition

What you need: One deck of playing cards

What you Do:

- 1. Shuffle the deck. Create a row of seven cards, face up. Place two cards on top of each of the seven so you have seven piles of 3 cards each. Arrange the cards so you can see the face value of every card.
- 2. Place the rest of the deck to the side, to be used later.
- 3. The object of the game is to remove a pile when the sum of all of its cards is 10, 20, or 30. All face cards equal 10. For example, if a pile has an ace, 9, jack in it, it could be removed because its sum is 20 (1+9+10). Go ahead and remove all of the piles that equal 10 to start.
- 4. Deal a fourth card on top of every pile that remains. Remove any stacks that now equal a multiple of 10.
- 5. Deal a fifth card on top of every pile that remains. Remove any stacks possible.
- 6. Continue adding cards and removing stacks until your deck is depleted or the stacks have all been removed.
- 7. If you remove all the stacks first, you have won! If your deck is emptied first, try again!

Add up the numbers in the ones place.


Add up all the partial sums.


Round and Adjust Addition:

Round the second number to the nearest 10.


Add the two numbers.


Add or subtract whatever is left over.


